

Nara& USA The Ancient Capital Adored by Many Cultural Figures

Nara is a historical city that was the capital of Japan up until the 8th century. It has Japan's

largest number of structures that are National Treasures. Nara developed international fame as the eastern terminus of the Silk Road that connected the Orient with the Occident. Towers of ancient temples that Ernest Fenollosa rhapsodized as

"frozen music" stand maiestically over Nara, and was visited by Albert Einstein and Helen Keller. Breathe for yourself the air of the ancient capital that was adored by such important (cultural figures.





The World's Largest **Bronze Buddha Statue:** the "Great Buddha of Nara"

A large temple constructed at the behest of the Emperor Shomu in the mid-8th century, the Great Buddha Hall is one of the largest wooden structures in the world. The Vairocana Buddhist statue enshrined here is the world's largest bronze Buddha statue (estimated weight of 380t, height of 15m) and is commonly known as the "Great Buddha of Nara." There are

other noteworthy sights such as the Great South Gate, Nigatsudo Hall, and Hokkedo Hall.

Ominugui Cleaning Ritual

Once a year, about 120 Buddhist priests and believers will all chant in unison and then engage in the ritual cleaning of the Great Buddha.

The azekura log-cabin style repository for treasures is located to the northwest of Todaiji Temple. Cultural artifacts that were brought to Japan over the Silk Road from places such as Persia, India, and China in the 8th century are housed here. Some are put on display at the Shosoin Exhibition held every autumn at the Nara National Museum.

Hasedera Temple

A Beautiful Mountain Temple Accentuated by Flowers of the Four Seasons

This majestic temple built on the mountainside of Mt. Hatsuse offers a spectacular view from the Main Hall that is reached after the 399 steps. Long known as the temple of flowers, it delights visitors with pleasurable glimpses of the four seasons in flowers such as cherries, peonies, and hydrangea, as well as autumnal hues and snowy winter scenery.

Kasuga Taisha Shrine

A Place to Pray for World Peace and **Universal Happiness**

This ancient shrine was constructed to protect Heijo-kyo at the base of Mt. Kasuga, which has from antiquity been worshipped as the mountain where a Shinto god descended. The vermillion structure looks stunning against the deep green and, in May, ubiquitous wisteria can be seen blossoming beautifully. The deer, which are considered to be the messengers of the god of Kasuga Taisha Shrine, wandering throughout the grounds are an impressive sight.

Nara Hotel



Built out of cypress as a dignified looking state guest house, Nara Hotel opened its doors in 1909. It is close to amous spots such as Todaiji Temple and Kasuga Taisha Shrine, and the eclectic East-West architectural design radiates classical elegance. Helen Keller and actors Marlon Brando and Glenn Ford stayed here.

Imai Town

A Town Where You Can Get a Taste of Japan in the Medieval Period

Just one step anywhere in the town can take you back on a journey through time.

Imai Town is designated an important conservation district for groups of traditional buildings due to its preservation of the rich atmosphere of 17th-18th century Japan.

A 5-minute Walk from the Station, You Are Greeted by 1,100 Wild Deer Nara Park is the very face of the ancient capital. Covering a vast area of 660 hectares, it features architectural structures such as

Todaiji Temple, Kofukuji Temple, Kasuga Taisha Shrine, the Nara National Museum and Shosoin Repository that blend in well with the majestic and rich greenery of the park. The deer that wander around in herds act as the park mascots.

Hozanji Temple

A Dynamic and Spectacular View from the Main Hall

Located on the slope of Mt. Ikoma, the main temple boasts a spectacular view of a massive stone formation as its backdrop. The Maitreya bodhisattva statue enshrined in the stone cavern makes for an exotic appearance. USA made locking devices were used in the guest hall that was built with an eclectic East-West architectural design on the temple grounds in 1884.

Fenollosa, Patron of the Japanese Arts

Ernest Fenollosa, a philosopher and Asian art historian from the USA, came to Japan in 1878 and made efforts at collecting the Japanese art that he saw being forsaken in Japan's march toward modernization. Having been responsible for the safekeeping of art objects at the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, Fenollosa is known for the debt owed to him by the world of Japanese art.

Yakushiji Temple East Pagoda

It is said that Ernest Fenollosa described the East Pagoda as "frozen music." There is a rhythmical beauty engendered by the layering of large and small roofs. The West Pagoda that was long ago destroyed by fire was rebuilt in 1981 by virtue of donations collected via the method of copying sutras for Yakushiji Temple. The vivid use of color makes for an elegant appearance that harkens back 1,300 years ago.

Yakushiji Temple

The Unique Layout Called "Yakushiji Style"

The unique layout of the Kondo (Main Hall) in the center and the east and west pagodas on either side has earned the name yakushiji style." As the Yakushi Triad enshrined in the Kondo were known as healing Buddhas, from times of old they gained popularity because they were relied on by those in need. The many cultural assets kept here make apparent the cultural influences that came to Japan via the Silk Road



The World's Oldest Wooden Structures and over 2,300 National Treasures and **Important Cultural Properties**

A temple constructed at the behest of the devout Buddhist Prince Shotoku and others in the early 7th century, it carries into the present many cultural properties, including the Saiin Garan (Western Precinct), the location of the world's oldest wooden structures. The Western Precinct consists of the Kondo (Main Hall) and the Goju-no-to (Five-Storied Pagoda), while the Eastern Precinct is organized around the Yumedono, the Hall of Visions. This was the first location in Japan to be designated by UNESCO as a World Heritage Site.

door of the Yumedono, the Hall of Visions, at Horyuji Temple. For about 1,000 years, Buddhist images guarded with absolute secrecy were found wrapped in cloth. Fenollosa untied the strings and found uncommon beauty in the gentle smile of the Kuze Kannon (Goddess of Mercy) (a life-size statue modeled after Prince Shotoku)
