

One Other Great Buddha

Nara, Japan's capital up until the 8th century, is still the location of many shrines, temples, Buddhist statues, and treasures that delight visitors. Famous among them is the "Todaiji Temple Vairocana Buddha (the Great Buddha)." Actually, it turns out that there is a Great Buddha in Singapore that is about the same size as this Great Buddha. Could the statues themselves know about this?

### The World's Largest Bronze Buddha Statue: the "Great Buddha of Nara"

A large temple constructed at the behest of the Emperor Shomu in the mid-8th century, the Great Buddha Hall is one of the largest wooden structures in the world. The Vairocana Buddhist statue enshrined here is the world's largest bronze Buddha statue (estimated weight of 380t, height of 15m) and is commonly known as the "Great Buddha of Nara." There are other noteworthy sights such as the Great South Gate, Nigatsudo Hall, and Hokkedo Hall.

### Shosoin Repository

The azekura log-cabin style repository for treasures is located to the northwest of Todaiji Temple. Cultural artefacts that were brought to Japan over the Silk Road from places such as Persia, India, and China in the 8th century are housed here. Some are put on display at the Shosoin Exhibition held every autumn at the Nara National Museum. Zoshi-cho, Nara City 20742-26-2811 (Imperial Household Agency Shosoin Office)

### A Place to Pray for World Peace and Universal Happiness

This ancient shrine was constructed to protect Heijo-kyo at the base of Mt. Kasuga, which has from antiquity been worshipped as the mountain where a Shinto god descended. The vermillion structure looks stunning against the deep green and, in May, ubiquitous wisteria can be seen blossoming beautifully. The deer, which are considered to be the messengers of the god of Kasuga Taisha Shrine, wandering throughout the grounds are an impressive sight

### The Unique Layout Called "Yakushiji Style"

### A Beautiful Mountain Temple Accentuated by Flowers of the Four Seasons

This majestic temple built on the mountainside of Mt. Hatsuse offers a spectacular view from the Main Hall that is reached after the 399 steps. Long known as the temple of flowers, it delights visitors with pleasurable glimpses of the four seasons in flowers such as cherries, peonies, and hydrangea, as well as autum hues and snowy winter scenery.

### The World's Oldest Wooden Structures and over 2,300 **National Treasures and Important Cultural Properties**

This temple was built at the behest of Prince Shotoku and Emperor Suiko at the beginning of the 7th century. Its Kondo (Main Hall) and Goiu-no-to (Five-Storied Pagoda) are the oldest wooden structures in the world. Furthermore, Horyuji Temple was the first location in Japan to

be designated a World Heritage Site by UNESCO. The temple garners attention all over the world as a treasure trove of Buddhist culture

## Sacred Sites and **Pilgrimage Routes** in the Kii Mountain Range

### An Untamed Pilgrimage Mecca Carved Out Harshly by Mother Nature

The Kii mountain range located in southern Nara consists of mountains almost 2,000m above sea level. As one of the oldest sacred lands in Japan, the bounty of nature that has made for such mountains has inspired awe in the Japanese since antiquity, Believed to be a place where the gods reside, it has given birth to Shugendo (mountain asceticism), a form of mountain faith unique to Japan that weds the worship of nature with Buddhism and other elements. Annual rainfall of over 4,000mm makes for lush forests and for 1,300 years the area has continued to be a pilgrimage mecca for many who seek ascetic training.

### The Fragrance of the Malay Peninsula in Nara

Nara shares a connection to the Malay Peninsula, which has long been a centre for collecting fragrances. From the 7th and 8th century coffins of aristocrats in the Marukoyama Tumulus of Asuka Village, "kapur," a fragrance that traces back to the Malay Peninsula, was detected. And in 734, Empress Komyo donated Malay "clove" to Horyuji Temple. The container used, the "Celadon Glazed Jar with Four Handles" (a National Treasure), is famous as the oldest porcelain piece in the world with known historical origin.

### **Komainu Dogs That Guard Shrines** and Temples

The Merlion, a combination of lion and fish, is the symbol of Singapore. Similar to this Merlion is the Komainu, a guardian creature seen at many shrines and temples. The Komainu is a mythical creature that is similar to both a lion and a dog. Pairs of Komainu stand on either side of the entrances to shrines and temples and are said to guard the sacred grounds.
